





The song Yankee Doodle originally made fun of American Revolutionary War soldiers who only wore a feather in their cap instead of the elaborate headwear worn by the members of the British Macaroni Club.

A doodle was a simpleton and the phrase "stuck a feather in his hat and called it macaroni" implied the backwoods bumpkins could put a feather in their coonskin hats and think they were as elegant as European in the latest Italian style -- the "macaroni."

"Macaroni" was the name given to British men who followed a flamboyant fashion trend in the late 18th century that was characterized by comical (i.e. foolish) and effeminate behaviors. Thus, as the New York Times puts it, the British soldiers were basically calling their "Yankee" counterparts "gay and bumbling".

By the time the Thirteen Colonies actually emerged victorious from Revolution, the song had more or less solidified its place in American history as a symbol of patriotism.

Annual Conference 2022 was June 9-11 with 448 clergy and 467 laity meeting inside the John S. Knight Center Akron, Oh

Highlights included:

- Bishop Malone celebrated the success of the \$1.5 million Teach Reach Bless campaign.
- Members approved a 12% increase in 2023 health care premiums.
- Members approved a 10% increase in 2023 minimum salaries for clergy.
- Members approved the 2023 Conference budget of \$9,764,559, a budget that is 5.3% lower than the 2022 budget.
- Members approved: Resolution 2022-01: "Reclaiming Peace" and Resolution 2022-03: "End the Death Penalty in Ohio". The Bishop tabled two other resolutions: # 03 "Support of the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation" and #04 "Supporting the Christmas Covenant" Two additional resolutions: #05 "Advocating for the Human Rights of Palestinian Children and Families Living Under Israeli Military Occupation" and one concerning gun violence were not acted upon before the conclusion of Annual Conference 2022.
- Members approved the disaffiliation of 11 churches and the closing of five churches.
- Members endorsed two episcopal candidates, listed in the order in which motions were made from the floor and approved by the body: Rev. Cara Stultz Costello and Rev. Jonathan Priebe.

Church History Day July 3

The Caldwell Methodist Church is celebrating 183 years of service on July 3, 2022

In 1839 the Methodist Episcopal Church was established in Olive. By 1859 it was decided to move the church to the new county seat of Caldwell to a piece of land donated by Samuel Caldwell, the town founder. A new church building was completed in 1897, dedicated with a several-day celebration.

A large pipe organ was purchased in 1910 with Mamie McKee as the first organist. The church was remodeled in 1917 and again in 1945.

Today it is a beautiful monument to the faith and dedication on it's many members throughout the years.



Independence Day - July 4, 2022

We can't fully appreciate our freedoms if we don't know how we got them — and, more importantly, how close we came to losing them. The story of America's independence is truly fascinating with more historical twists and turns than we can possibly get into here.


The first Independence Day celebration took place in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776. This was also the day that the Declaration of Independence was first read in public after people were summoned by the ringing of the Liberty Bell.

The only two signers of the Declaration of Independence who later served as President of the United States were John Adams and Thomas Jefferson. President John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe all died on the Fourth. Adams and Jefferson (both signed the Declaration) died on the same day within hours of each other in 1826.

Benjamin Franklin proposed the turkey as the national bird but was overruled by John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, who recommended the bald eagle.

Every 4th of July the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia is tapped (not actually rung) thirteen times in honor of the original thirteen colonies.


