This is it – my last Newsletter for Caldwell UMC. Coming in mid-year to two blizzards which canceled services for two weeks – and now going out in the midst of a pandemic -I am certain that you will remember my time here as your pastor! I've never been "conventional." Seriously, I will miss all of you.

Never Dies, which is a sequel to the musical, Phantom of the Opera, "Love never dies," has been in my heart and mind lately. Perhaps that's one reason my devotions during quarantine have been on the great love chapter in the Bible, 1 Corinthians 13. There are vital lessons for all of us as we "start over," by opening our building for in-person worship. That will happen June 7, but it may not feel like the same church service prior to our quarantine. A letter will go out next Tuesday, giving you explicit instructions on our "new normal." 1 Corinthians reminds us that, "Love is patient, love is kind." Please be patient with one another. Be kind to each other. We all have strong emotions over the issues surrounding this

pandemic. Some are angry that the church building ever closed. Some feel as if we are being overly cautious. Some don't like masks. Others want things to go back immediately like we left them in March. There are those who will not be back – at least for a while. Respect their decisions. Respect other's opinions. We are err-The line from the old movie, Love ing on the side of caution. We are living our faith – not in fear, but in love. We love each of you and do not want to harm anyone.

> All that said, I want you to remember that as I leave and Pastor Jeff Coggins comes to be your pastor. Give him your patience and kindness. Help him navigate the "new" in all of this. Don't assume you know what he is thinking. Ask him. Don't rush him. Give him the space he and Darcy need to settle into life in Caldwell. Re -read 1 Corinthians 13 and begin to absorb all it says. Apply the rules of love to everything you do. Most of you know I am moving to a new state and a new chapter in my life called retirement. It will take me some time to get use to my new normal in Lenoir, NC. It is going to take a lot for



Summer Sack Lunch Program

Noble Local (Shenandoah) will be delivering meals to Sarahsville (their school), Belle Valley, Ava, Summerfield, Caldwell UMC, The Happy Time Pool, and, perhaps, Dexter City if they can secure a site. Deliveries of packages containing 3 days of meals for each child will be made on Mondays and Thursdays. Caldwell Schools will be continuing their Wednesday program, distributing packages containing 5 days of meals for each child. Distributions will be made at the Caldwell Elementary School.

Both of these programs will continue throughout June and July. Noble Local has indicated they may be able to use some volunteers to help prepare the meals. Preparation will be taking place at the Noble County Fairground. They may also be able to use some volunteers to meet the vans at the drop off locations. Let's give pastors and church decision-makers a break. I have often said pastors have the most difficult job in the world. For proof, read An Open Letter To Pastors. You Are Loved And Respected. But because of COVID-19, these are especially challenging times for those entrusted with the health and well-being of the local church. In short, pastors are in a no-win situation when it comes to re-opening. No matter what decision is made, there is great passion within each congregation for doing the exact opposite of whatever the leaders choose to do. Conversations about urgency vs. passivity, facts vs. feelings, and safety vs. trust are dramatically impacting many church's spirit of unity and thus, its ability to thrive moving forward. Regardless of the reopening date, those decisions will likely be both celebrated and questioned. Therefore, it is important we support and pray for our pastors so they can focus on hearing from an audience of One, the Holy Spirit himself, and being obedient to do what pleases Him, not everyone else. The answer will likely be different from church to church, state to state, and region to region. I live in Georgia. Our context for reopening is certainly different than New York, New Jersey, Michigan, and Illinois for example. But even in our state with a highly-aggressive and pro-church governor, many churches are not opening until July or after. Others opened on May 3rd, the first day of eligibility. Because of the disparity of viewpoints and as illustrated above, extremely vocal thoughts and questions have arisen. The following are just some of what I hear locally as well as nationally:

- "I can get a tattoo, go bowling, and go into a store and buy cannabus but I can't go to church?"
- "Who cares what other churches are doing? What is God telling you to do?"
- "Are my children going to be safe? What about my elderly parents? When are they going to be safe?"
- "Do you honestly believe digital is better than being live?"
- "What about a 2nd wave?"
- "Isn't this the 2nd wave?"
- "Why didn't you start planning for the day you could immediately reopen the day you closed?"

• "If we open now, what if only 20-30% of the people come back? Shouldn't we wait until everyone can come?"

• "If only 20-30% of the people come back, the others still have a digital option. Right?"

• "Whose heart at our church breaks because its doors are not open and what are they doing about it?"

And on and on and on....

You have probably heard all of these and more. I'll say it again, pastors have probably never had it so difficult. These individuals are shepherds who deeply love their congregations and care about people. They value unity and would never do anything to hurt those God has called them to lead. All Christians need to be supporting and praying for their pastors because there are going to be no popular decisions. And I don't know if there are any right decisions either. Only time will tell. The only right answer for pastors from my perspective is after much prayer, time with God, and discussions with their leaders, to reopen when God tells them to. Not a Sunday earlier and not a Sunday later. We can live with those results whatever they may be.



H.A.R.P will be holding the fourth annual Share-A-Thon on June 2nd from 8am-6pm. The funds raised will go directly to helping low-income families, veterans, seniors, and disabled adults. H.A.R.P provides necessary home repairs, wheelchair ramps, maintenance, and furnishings to those who are physically and financially not able to provide for themselves and their family. By removing the financial burden of these repairs, families are set upon the path of self-sufficiency and able to progress on creating an independent lifestyle or ageing in place.

Over 46 families have already applied this year and are in desperate need of assistance with housing projects. By participating in the Share-a-Thon, donors will help provide wheelchair ramps to disabled veterans, and seniors, as well as home repair projects for over 100 families this year.

Pentecost is the annual Christian festival commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit on the disciples of Jesus after his ascension from earth to heaven on Ascension Day. It always falls on the seventh Sunday after Easter. Pentecost means "fiftieth day", as it is celebrated on Pentecost Sunday, the 50th day of the Easter season (including Easter Sunday, the first day, in the counting). 
We are also called by God to serve and to do works of justice. Needs will keep changing, and United Methodist Women will continue to call for action on behalf of women, children and youth and marginalized people.


