

Thankful For My Dog Day – November 23, 2022

Thankful for My Dog Day on November 23 is celebrated by all dog lovers in the United States. It's a day dedicated to appreciating dogs for cheering us up, making us laugh, offering company, love, and undeniable loyalty, and bringing us joy in different ways. Big dogs, small dogs, yappy dogs, fluffy dogs, all kinds of dogs deserve our love and affection every day, but most of all on Thankful for My Dog Day.

Throw Out Your Leftovers Day – November 29, 2022

The goal of the day is to get all of us to throw away the leftovers that are rotting in the fridge and frankly too far gone for consumption. Food wastage is a serious issue that concerns every one of us. When you cook the right amount of food, you ensure that none is going to waste. This day aims to make people realize the importance of food and why one must not waste it.

First Sunday of Advent – November 27, 2022

The Advent season marks the ushering in of the liturgical year which is observed as a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the nativity or birth of Christ and his return in the Second Coming. During Advent, devout Christians take the time to pray, reflect on the past year, mourn for the sin and evil in the world, or express hope and joy for the Second Coming.

The traditional Advent period begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, and it lasts through Christmas Eve (December 24), unless Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday, in which case, Christmas eve becomes the fourth Sunday of Advent. The traditional themes of Advent allow us—through meditation, prayer, and affirmation—to contemplate ways to share our deepest gifts: hope, peace, love, and joy. The traditional color of Advent is purple or blue, with the candle for love being pink and the Christ candle (Christmas Day) being white.

On November 24, 1971, the day before Thanksgiving, a "nondescript" man who appeared to be in his mid-40s and about 6 feet tall (1.83 metres) bought a \$20 ticket for Northwest Orient Airlines Flight 305. He gave his name as Dan Cooper, which later turned out to be fake. A reporter mistakenly named him D.B. Cooper, also fake. He hijacked that plane and Cooper demanded four parachutes and \$200,000 in \$20 bills. After receiving this in Seattle and releasing the passengers, Cooper then had the crew take off for Mexico, but he parachuted out of the plane over Southwestern Washington State and never was heard from again. Some of the money was recovered along the Columbia River but Cooper real identity and what became of him remains the only unsolved air piracy case in U.S. aircraft history.

Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade

Since 1924, people have been delighted by the spectacle of the Macy's department store's annual holiday parade. That first year, it was actually called the Macy's Christmas Parade, held as a promotional event to officially kick off the holiday shopping season. The parade was an instant hit, and in 1927, the name was changed to reflect the fact that it always falls on Thanksgiving. The first couple years of the parade, from 1924 to 1926, saw handlers marching the route with animals borrowed from the Central Park Zoo. Draped in Macy's promotional pennants, elephants, donkeys, tigers, camels and bears were paraded down the streets of New York City for the crowd's enjoyment. However, not everyone was a fan—in 1927, Macy's decided to replace the creatures with oversized balloon versions, because—imagine this—the live animals scared the children too much. Felix the Cat debuted in 1927 as the first giant balloon to ever take part in the Macy's Day parade. In 1928, Felix was inflated with helium, and without a plan to deflate this massive balloon, parade organizers simply let Felix fly off into the sky. According to reports and thanks to the parade, Macy's is the second largest consumer of Helium in the world. Only the US Government consumes more. Balloons take from 90 min to two hours to inflate and 15 minutes to deflate.

The Rocking Horse is the oldest float still in use for the Parade. It was handmade by the legendary Manny Bass, a Parade designer for over 40 years.

The Ohio State vs University of Michigan Rivalry

*The teams first met on Oct. 16, 1897 in Ann Arbor. Michigan won 34-0.

*There have been six ties in this rivalry. The two teams played to a 0-0 ending in their second meeting in 1900 and tied each other in '10, '41, '49, '73 and '92.

*Today, Buckeyes players receive a "Gold Pants Charm" if they beat Michigan. Each player and coach on an Ohio State team that beats Michigan receives the Gold Pants, inscribed with the player or coach's initials, the date of the victory, and the score of the game.


*On Nov. 25, 1950, Ohio State and Michigan faced off in Columbus with the Big Ten title on the line. Whichever team won would have to overcome their opponent, 10-degree weather, 28-mile per hour winds, and snow falling at a rate of two inches per hour (If you think I'm being hyperbolic about the conditions, check out this video.). Both teams punted a collective 45 times for 1,408 yards and Michigan managed to win 9-3 accumulating only 27 yards of offense and no first downs in a game forever known as the "Snow Bowl." Ohio State head coach Wes Fesler resigned amidst severe criticism about this play-calling in the game and was replaced by Woody Hayes. Woody Hayes won five national titles in Columbus and went 12-6 against Michigan from 1951-68.




